Park Musings (from the Super)

Another summer has ended, and we are pulling out the green fleece here at the park for the fall breezes. It's been a very productive summer! Some highlights include the major makeover at the Judge Morris Estate. A new cedar shake roof, and improvements to the stone masonry including the beautiful barn ruins, funded by Friends support via grant. This space will be a wonderful courtyard area for special events, weddings, or just a place to sit and enjoy the beautiful area. Terri Tipping's environmental stewardship team continues to battle the invasives and plant natives, and the pollinator garden is still teeming with insects (bird food!) and pollinators. Our own stewardship team has finally been fully staffed and are a support to our many weed warrior projects.

The Carpenter area is in full swing with cross country, and we are looking forward to hosting the Division One Colonial Athletic Association championships later in October. We've been told that our disc golf course is one of the busiest in the state, which made us take a close look and plan some improvements. Soon we will have leveled tee pads, new disc baskets, and better signage.

Possum Hill (on Smith Mill Road) is one of our most popular sites now, and we were pleased to host the Trail Etiquette tenting events where our partner user groups helped share info on how to be a responsible and safe trail user. Kudos to our assistant superintendent Alivia who helped build and grow the program through the summer. We had lots of interactions with the public and good ideas for growing the way we get the message out in 2023.

Our energies are focused on planning for the new Nature Center now that we received state funding. Currently our programming staff (including Friends representation) are discussing interpretive planning goals for the park and for the building. Our "PPD" group (planning, preservation, and development) are working with GWWO Architects on a vision for the new building. We are extremely excited for this project and are pleased to include the Friends in the planning. We also have plans for a big office move to the Maxwell property, located on Wedgewood Road adjacent to Carpenter. While this is not funded yet we are already working on exterior improvements as we continue to seek support.

Lastly, we are thrilled to have welcomed Ann Burruss as our new manager of volunteers. Ann has absolutely hit the ground running and I am still pinching myself that we got such a good hire. She has too much planned to list here!

Thank you to all of you who support this park- I've worked at four sites in my career, and I can tell you unequivocally that this park has the most motivated, friendly, and engaged volunteers and supporters of all. We cannot do it without you- THANK YOU!




Join us!
